If we had to identify a single challenge as the ultimate *nisayon* of our generation, many

would say it's the chinuch of our children. Our world is faced with many unprecedented challenges. But for the most part, they can be traced to a deficiency in the life skills development of our younger population. Ultimately, it boils down to chinuch.

When we consider the fact that mechanchim today have

a more formal training than any previous generation and have access to better teaching methods and resources than even one generation ago, the phenomenon becomes all the more confounding.

Rabbi Chaim Pechter. Menahel of Yeshiva Ohavei Torah in Riverdale notes that this is not a result of a lack in ability in and of itself. It is far more fundamental. In past generations, our lives were dictated by expectations and responsi-

bilities. The onus of living up to one's obligations was as given. Therefore, a bochur's deficiency in a specific skill or skill set was certainly a detriment; but it did not seal his fate or eliminate his prospects for owning up to his shortcomings and going on to fulfill his mission in life.

In today's society, when things don't work out the way someone anticipates, there's an instinct that says "this is not for me; why should I even bother trying?" Our lifestyle revolves so much around the ideal of gratification that if something doesn't come to me geshmak. I'm out.

In a world like this, the stakes of lacking proper skills are of a completely differ-

ent proportion. A deficiency in skills today doesn't just mean the *bochur* will be more in Yeshiva or just *aliyah* in *ruchniyus*, per se.

This skill set goes far beyond succeeding







challenged; it isn't just a lack of opportunity; it means his ability to go through life as an accomplished ben Torah will be compromised.



Ultimately, it applies to every arena in his life. The strengths a bochur acquires in yeshiva ultimately serve him in every juncture in his life, whether it's relationships, or business, or child rearing, or whatever responsibilities he will have to live up to.

It's takes a uniquely skilled rebbe to cultivate life skills. It's not something that can simply be conveyed or taught in a classroom. It requires a relationship that connects to the nafshivus of the talmid and nurtures the kochos from within. It takes a *rebbi* who serves as a role model who bochurim naturally aspire to emulate. The *rebbi* then becomes a living example of the virtues of achrayus, of goal setting, and of overcoming challenges to live up to one's responsibilities.

Eighteen years ago, a vision was conceived. It was a bold and pioneering ambition for a trendsetting chinuch institution where *bochurim* would be endowed with the crucial life skills for success in whichever life path they choose to pursue.

The visionaries behind Yeshiva Ohavei Torah set a high bar for themselves. The yeshiva's upcoming 18th Anniversary Dinner celebrates the remarkable fulfilment of that vision. But beyond that, it's an opportunity to recognize and appreciate how the

fulfilment of this vision goes to the very heart of the chinuch challenge of our generation.
